Free Resource for Medically Fragile Children in Child Care

PACT: Helping Children with Special Needs has introduced a training and coaching program for child care providers serving children with developmental disabilities and special healthcare needs.

With support of the Maryland Developmental Disabilities Council and the Maryland State Department of Education, PACT offers this newly developed service. This collaborative model is designed to support Baltimore City child care providers with on-site training sessions and coaching with a Registered Nurse and expert child care teacher. The nurse can provide the following supports:

- Mealtime strategies for children with special diets or feeding tubes.
- Equipment training (orthotics, walkers, feeding pumps, medical monitors)
- Recognizing and planning for sudden breathing problems in children,
- Emergency plan implementation (seizure and asthma action plans)

Information You Can Use

Federal Surplus Property Donation Program

If you operate a non-profit child care program you are eligible to seek approval to obtain surplus property from the federal government at no cost. The Department of General Services is the designated state agency to administer the Federal Donation Program. ImmuNet: Keeping Maryland Families Healthy

ImmunNet is Maryland's Immunization Information System (IIS), a confidential and secure vaccination database that is HIPPA-compliant. ImmunNet stores an Individual's vaccination history only in a web- based tool. Maryland ImmuNet laws identify child care programs as authorized users, who can look up a child's vaccination history by completing an online enrollment form. Immunization records can be printed for a child's file. For additional information visit: health.maryland.gov/ImmuNet. For families needing to view and print their child's vaccination record they visit MD.MyIR.net and complete an on-line form. They will receive a code to access records. For additional information visit: health.maryland.gov/FindMyIR.

2020 US Census

It is extremely important that all children be counted in the upcoming census. When the last census was done in 2010 an estimated 1 million children were not counted. The census is a means to determine local funding and when children are missed funding for critical programs such as SNAP, National School Lunch Program, and Children's Health Insurance are negatively impacted. Please spread the word and help parents understand how important an accurate census count is to our community.

Child are Adult Food Program (CACFP)

If your program does not participate in the CACFP perhaps it is time to take another look. The program under the direction of the USDA provides both financial and educational resources to assure that children are receiving high quality meals and establishing healthy eating habits. Good News at Tax Time

Two Hefty Credits Help Working Families

Working families can put extra cash in their pockets at tax time by claiming the Earned Income Credit (EIC). The EIC is a tax provision that allows eligible taxpayers to reduce their tax burden.

Families may qualify for the federal and state EIC, if, in 2019, they:

- were raising one child and earned less than \$41,094; or less than \$46,884 if married.
- were raising two children and earned less than \$46,703; or \$52,493, if married.
- were raising three or more children and earned less than \$50,162; or \$55,952 if married.
- had no children, earned less than \$15,570; or \$21,370 if married.

The EIC is the biggest tax benefit for working families, but there are other important tax credits. The Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, gives families with child care expenses up to \$3,000 for one child or up to \$6,000 for two or more children, a tax credit.
