Feeling Blue?

You are not alone and BCCCRC is here to help.

hen we begin to write each newsletter, it is the custom to look back at the same time period of the previous year. In doing so, I am struck by the fact that as 2019 was ending, the BCCCRC newsletter for the winter of 2020 was full of hope as BCCCRC joined The Family Tree, and enthusiasm for all the planned activities, and new collaborations. Little did we know, or ever suspect, that just two-and-a-half months into the winter of 2020 we would be faced with a global pandemic that none of us could have imagined.

Now, here we are heading into the winter of 2021 with the virus raging, the holidays not looking so festive, and a general feeling of anxiety and fear. According to a recent study from John Hopkins University, School of Public Health, issues caused by the pandemic such as fear of illness, social distancing, school closures, work restrictions, and decreased revenue for child care programs are leading to a marked increase in psychological distress, such as anxiety, depression and sleep issues.

Over the past weeks, BCCCRC staff have fielded increasing numbers of telephone calls from early care and education providers who are feeling anxious and isolated. A few months ago, there were





conversations about a "new normal" but for now there is no normal and there is the need to support one another as we face the coming months.

To this end, BCCCRC's Early Intervention Project is offering a forum for providers to come together and talk, ask questions, get information, and just be a support for one another during this uneasy time. The "Working Together" Support Group meets monthly via the Zoom Platform. Those who have attended a group have found the sessions helpful and invigorating. Kim Sydnor, a recent participant in a Working Together group said the following: "Today's provider support group was a great space for me to be heard. I truly enjoyed it. And meeting you, it's always my pleasure to be in the room with those who are dedicated to the well-being of our children."

Good News at Tax Time Two Hefty Credits Help Working Families

Working families can put extra cash in their pockets at tax time by claiming the Earned Income Credit (EIC). The EIC is a tax provision that allows eligible taxpayers to reduce their tax burden.

Families may qualify for the federal and state EIC, if, in 2020, they:

- were raising one child and earned less than \$41,756; or less than \$47,646 if married.
- were raising two children and earned less than \$47,440; or \$53,330, if married.
- were raising three or more children and earned less than \$50.954: or \$56.844 if married.
- had no children, earned less than \$15,820; or \$21,710 if married.

The EIC is the biggest tax benefit for working families, but there are other important tax credits. The Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, gives families with child care expenses up to \$3,000 for one child or up to \$6,000 for two or more children, a tax credit.

Infant-toddler educators have one of the most important jobs in the world, but they often lack the practical resources to support them. The ZERO TO THREE Critical Competencies for Infant-Toddler Educators™ competency model defines the specific knowledge and practices required for infant-toddler educators to be successful now, and to support the future of our children. Baltimore City Child Care Resource Center in partnership with Howard County Resource and Referral Center will be offering the 45 hour class beginning in January. Looking for Twenty Family Child Care Providers

BCCCRC and twenty family child care providers have the opportunity to participate in a pilot program to investigate how smart, strategic business management systems and business coaching can help the child care industry move forward, and become a sustainable business model no matter what obstacles are thrown in the way. Before COVID-19, the child care industry in the United States was already in an uphill battle to survive. Research is showing that there is no quick fix, but there are promising practices that could change the child care industry from one always struggling to survive to a robust, financially successful business model.

Opportunities Exchange is an organization that has been working for over ten years to "help the early childhood field achieve financial stability and strong child outcomes through Shared Services". With a proven track record, Opportunities Exchange has developed a strategy to address systemic issues in the early childhood field in order to move away from status quo and begin to invent the child care system.

Along with two other Child Care Resource Centers in the state, BCCCRC will begin a pilot project early in 2021 with Opportunities Exchange. The project will focus on the first strategy - automation and business coaching. We will begin small with twenty family child care providers from each of the three jurisdictions, with the hope that a successful outcome of the pilot will lead to further investment for the expansion of the shared services model. The project will provide free professional business training and coaching, free use of a child care management system with tech support, and one-on-one support from a BCCCRC consultant.

In order to get the project off the ground, BCCCRC is currently recruiting family child care providers for the pilot project. Ideally, those who are interested would have the following qualifications:

1.) Have been licensed for less than ten years; 2.) Access to reliable technology and some skill in using technology; 3.) Willingness to use an automated child care management system and participate in training and coaching sessions; and 4.) Interest in becoming a leader in the movement to transform the child care industry.
